Look up a living poet and explore his or her work. Read as many poems by your chosen poet as you can, and then choose ONE poem and respond to the following prompt (responses should be between 250-500 words. Be concise but not unnecessarily brief):

Philosopher Dewitt Parker wrote in his book <u>The Principles of Aesthetics</u>, "Even when ostensibly directed to some particular person, a poem has an audience which is really universal...Art is autonomous expression meant to be contagious." How does the poem that you have chosen reflect this universal, contagious nature of art? You may wish to consider the theme, imagery, rhythm, and techniques that the poet employs.
