## A Word from President Keough

Dear Saint Agnes and Arlington Catholic Community,

Have you ever wondered if there was "someone up there" pulling strings in your life? I have, especially in the time since announcing my retirement. Why did I travel this career path? Why looking back on it does it seem so logical and predetermined?



As a young person, I secretly wanted to be a United States Senator. However, after

just a few political science courses I quickly gave up on the idea. I was sure I wasn't smart enough, so I changed direction and instead majored in history, hoping to become an attorney. However, after looking into law school, I again became discouraged and scrapped the idea. This is when by chance, I "fell into" teaching. At first as a substitute teacher and then as an aide. I quickly gravitated toward the behaviorally challenged students, and found a home in an alternative education program in Burlington. I was so comfortable in that environment that it hardly felt like work. In fact, it was here in the earliest stages of teaching that I came to believe that maybe God had a plan for me, and that maybe it involved serving young people and society.

As time went on, leadership roles came my way. I took my first assistant principal job and quickly learned that it is harder than it looks. The work of managing discipline for 900 students was just too much. I'll never forget one of my supervisors suggesting I spend less time "talking" with students and more time "...assigning discipline". I was disheartened, wondering how I could ever help troubled young people without understanding and knowing them first. In fact, I considered leaving education completely at that point, but at the last moment miraculously found a job working for a principal who renewed my hope. She valued my approach and assured me that knowing and putting the students first was the <u>only</u> proper way to lead in education. It was Divine insight. Being "student centered" became my mantra and it remains such to this day. Over time, I started to see a pattern in my life. I found myself being offered positions that fit my skills...*and* I tended not to get those that didn't. It was as if someone was sending me to certain places at certain times because that was where I was needed most.... Or conversely, because that was where I needed to go in order to grow more or see my true potential. Such was the case returning to my hometown district, where I had left as a C student with little hope for the future, to come back 40 years later as the Superintendent. A scenario that was once considered unimaginable came to be...almost magically.

Concluding my career here at Saint Agnes and Arlington Catholic, where I have had the chance to serve kids <u>and</u> God has been the icing on top. It has been a gift that in hindsight I can now see was simply part of a larger plan. None of my career decisions have been coincidental. Perhaps this is why so many of us working here care so much about each child reaching their true God given potential...because we know it is part of the Master plan. I feel fortunate to have played a part in it here in Arlington and thank you and God for the opportunity.

## Alumni Spotlight: Mary Benson Skipper '85

Every day, I get the opportunity and grace to serve the children and families of the Boston Public Schools. This is my third year as Superintendent and my 24th year in the District which I call home. I started my teaching career here in Boston back in 1989 as a Latin teacher at Boston Latin Academy, served as the founding Principal of TechBoston Academy in Dorchester where I spent a decade, had the opportunity to serve as the BPS Superintendent for our high schools and now am humbled to be the Superintendent for our District of 49,000 children and 12,000 educators and staff. Along the course of my career, in between my start and return to BPS, I spent five formative years teaching at BC High where I deepened my faith and learned about Ignatian Spirituality as a welcome call to action, putting my faith into practice. Between 2015-2022, I also spent seven years in the amazing community of Somerville as the Superintendent. My time in Somerville allowed me to return physically to my roots of where I grew up on the Arlington /Somerville border, working in the community at Foodmaster and learning and growing through my time as a student at Tufts University.

I loved my time at Arlington Catholic (AC). So many of my teachers fostered my love of learning and my classmates were -simply put -such talented, smart, and good friends. From Sister Ruth Cronin I learned the importance of persistence and hard work in the Classics as she walked with me every step every day as I struggled with Latin in my first year. Mr. Bill Murray pushed and stretched my mind and learning and taught me the importance of mastery and detail in English and the Classics. From Mr. Morrisette, I learned a love of History and the practical importance of connecting with your students and adding humor into teaching. And from the Sisters of St. Joseph as a whole, I learned what service for others meant on a daily basis and was offered an incredible model of living out one's faith through vocation. My mom also worked at AC while I was a student there as the lunch mom with the 'magic hands' that ran the snack shop. My mom really loved young people and seeing how much my classmates loved her is still one of my best memories. I belonged to many clubs but my favorite was the Year Book club, where writing, art, and creativity all came together for our Class of 1985.

Both my formation at AC as a student and my time at BC High as a teacher serve today as a foundation for why I do what I do. I believe God calls us to our work if we listen and provides us the gifts and graces we need to carry out that call. For me, my work in education has never been a job. It has always been a ministry and one that gives back four fold whatever I give to it. I have had the blessing to work with the most incredible students, staff and families over the course of my career. As a single mom without any means to put me through college, my mom reinforced from day one that for me, getting a good education would equal the playing field in life and that AC was that opportunity for me. She also had a strong faith and knew that AC would help ensure that I would grow not only as a student, but more importantly as a person grounded by faith. My mom worked hard doing multiple jobs to make sure I could go to AC because she knew all that it could offer me.

Maximize every minute of your time at AC as it really is such an awesome opportunity. Throw yourself into the community and find things that interest you, groups you can join, sports you can try, and subjects you can study. The sum of your growth there will be one part what is offered and two parts what you put into it. Your four years will go by fast but they will be the foundation of your future education, your future faith, and your future self.






